

The Making of a Gay First Day Cover


I have collected stamps since about the age of 6. I guess I have been Gay since that time too, but there wasn't the same level of awareness at that age. Nor in 1942 would I have made a connection between the two. In one of the ads for the First Day Covers I now produce I have made the connection: STAMP COLLECTING WAS FUN AS A KID - NOW IT CAN BE GAY AS AN ADULT.


In late 1978 I spent some timethinking that next year would be the 10th anniversary of what I guess can be called the modern day Gay & Lesbian Movement. Not that there wasn't considerable activity of a positive nature before Stonewall; but that event seems to have crystalized issues for a lot of us.

Because of my present profession, I felt unable to do anything overt to celebrate the event. Then it struck me that just as the organization N. O. W - New York was working on the stamp collecting public's level of consciousness through their FIRST DAY COVER SERIES on WOMEN'S HISTORY, why couldn't Gays do the same? Why couldn't I do something like that. And so the idea was born.

I would like to be able to say that I was the first to think of it. However, one of my customers has done a similar thing just for his own collection and has been kind enough to send me a photo copy of a FIRST DAY COVER he made in 1973. It is, to my knowledge, the earliest such philatelic item. I think, however, I can claim to be the first to attempt it on a commercial type scale.

This is a copy of what is probably the first 'Gay Events' cover





The first cover produced by me was for the ROBERT F. KENNEDY 15¢ of January 12, 1979. There were 261 covers produced and numbered. This Cover listed as #1A was printed for me by Postal Instant Press and carries the cachet of Harvey Milk. (One other unnumbered copy exists as when I was in Washington to have the covers cancelled on the actual first day, I sold one unserviced copy of this and Cover #1 to another interested attender of the First Day Celebration.)

It should be noted that a Cover #1 was serviced but has never been put up for sale. The cachet was of the man who deflected the gun in Sara Jane Moore's attempted assassination of President Ford. The incident had been reported in TIME and the fact that the man was Gay was also noted in the TIME article. I later learned that Oliver S. found the publicity unwelcome and so I withdrew the cover entirely. None have been sold. 507 numbered covers with this cachet of Oliver S. were serviced. (Also 1 unnumbered cover was sold unserviced at the First Day Celebration of the Robert Kennedy stamp.)

Since I felt the need to protect my identity, I went through the process of incorporation in the State of Pennsylvania under the title LAMBDA- λ STAMPS, INC. I also use the title M.J.S.- λ (LAMBDA) STAMPS. The "M.J.S." simply being my initials. (March 19, 1979)

My first attempt at advertising consisted in a handmade mimeographed flyer which I sent out as an insert to Cover # 3 the cachet being of Dag Hammarskjold for the International Year of the Child stamp. These were sent to nearly 300 Lesbian and Gay organizations in the United States, Great Britain, France, Australia, Canada, Spain and Sweden - mostly to the U.S.A.

The next advertising took the form of a small display ad in LINN'S STAMP NEWS and there is an ongoing classified ad in that journal. Other advertising ventures were made in the Gay Press. A quarter page display ad (copy attached) appeared in THE ADVOCATE. At an earlier time a smaller display ad showing Cover #5 with a small information blurb where the address would be was used.

Ads also appeared in THE VILLAGE VOICE special supplement as a 1/2 page display ad. Classified ads appeared in CHRISTOPHER STREET.



For about a 6 month period a full page ad appeared in FIRST DAYS, the journal of the American First Day Cover Society. These ads were also made up as advertising flyers which I have used to send out when I receive inquiries.

Putting together ads has often been the most difficult end of this endeavor. Most of the outlets such as THE ADVOCATE and THE VILLAGE VOICE required what is called a velox to be submitted. This meant I had to go out and find what and where such things were done. Both LINN'S STAMP NEWS and FIRST DAYS would do all that for their customers.

The designing and art work on almost all the cachets have been my own. Covers #'s 7, 7A, 7B, 7C, 8 reproduce either photographs, drawings or logos for which I paid for permission (#7,8) or received permission (#7B) to reproduce.

To date this has been a one person operation from start to finish. One exception to this was when my lover and I went to Chicago for the First Day Ceremonies for the Saving & Loan stamp and of course Dennis' moral support all through the project.



To date there have been 21 covers in the GAY HISTORY SERIES, counting the cover mentioned which was withdrawn and the two separate cancel locations for the 1979 Christmas stamp (though the same cachet is used).

It has been a fun thing for me and I feel that it may also have raised the consciousness of some people to the fact that Lesbians and Gays are everywhere and contributing just as much to our society and civilization as anyone. I am somewhat thrilled to think I may have been the first to place an open advertisement for Lesbian & Gay products in two trade journals: LINN'S STAMP NEWS and FIRST DAYS as well as being mentioned in the Stamp News Section of the CHICAGO SUN




Gay And Lesbian History on Stamps

The following artists and their works can be found on stamps of many nations. Some of these artists were gay and others were bisexual, all are a

Leonardo Da Vinci (1452-1519) was a painter, sculptor, architect, engineer, anatomist, botanist, astronomer, musician, and as such, a man of many talents. Leonardo was arrested twice for sodomy, Some of his favorite youthful lovers were Cesare da Sesto, Giuliano Boltroffio, and Andrea Salaino. Francesco Milzi came into Leonardo's life as a replacement youth for Andrea Salaino, his devoted assistant.



Scott # 601

Michelangelo Buonarroti (1475-1564) was an Italian sculptor, painter, architect, engineer, and poet. He is most admired for his sculptures of David, his painting of the Sistine Chapel, and hundreds of other works of art. In his later years he composed Platonic love poems, which were written mostly to men (see p. 136 in *Hidden Heritage* by Byrne Fone), his servant, friends, and his nephew. Some editors have changed the pronouns of hs sonnets so that "signore" became "donna."

Il Sodoma (1477-1549), an Italian painter, can be found on stamps of the Vatican City and Burundi. He studied under Leonard Da Vinci. Sodoma usually dressed in a gaudy fashion. He was accompanied by a flock of handsome boys wherever he went. When he accepted a commission, he stipulated that payment be "expenses of certain boys."

Raphael (1483-1520) was an Italian painter. He is featured on the stamps of practically every country in the world. He was known as the "Divine Painter," and was summoned to Rome in 1508 to participate in the decoration of the Vatican. He was an exceedingly beautiful young man who became quite wealthy because of the popularity of his paintings. When he was in Rome, two of his favorite pupils (Giulio Romano and Gianfrancesco Penni) lived with him. He died on his 37th birthday of a fever, and was mourned by thousands.

Benvenuto Cellini (1500-1571) was an Italian sculptor. He is depicted on stamps of Austria, Italy, and Romania. He was born in Florence, Italy, and was apprenticed to a goldsmith at the age of 15. He moved to Rome at the age of 19 and secured the favor of Popes Leo X., Clement VII, and Paul III. Paul III loved Cellini dearly. Cellini eventually settled in the Court of Francis I in Paris for a period of five years. He was forced to leave the court due to the ill will of the King's mistress and some Courtiers, possibly as a result of his homosexual activities. He had later personal problems and feuds with friends due to his homosexuality.

Antonia Canova (1757-1822) was an Italian sculptor, who can be found on the stamps of Dahomey, Italy, and the Vatican City. When Canova was 13, Senator Falier of Venice became impressed by his work and became a patron of his sculptures. Falier financed his training in the field of sculpturing. Senator Falier's son became Canova's intimate friend for life.

Dr. Mary Walker: Her portrait "doctored" to add femininity

Philatelists who aren't too diligent will undoubtedly assume that Dr. Mary Walker, honored on a recent 20¢ commemorative stamp, was a nice lady who was an Army surgeon and won the Medal of Honor, as stated on the face of the stamp and in U.S. Postal Service announcements. There's more to this Mary Walker than meets the eye, however, and for those who are interested in some details, check out Jonathan Katz's book, Gay American History, pp. 243-248 (Crowell edition). The picture in the book shows her looking like a butch crone, not the sweet femme item shown on the stamp, and postal officials admit they doctored up known portraits of her for philatelic imagery purposes. Dr. Walker in fact was an active writerparticipant in the dress reform movement of the mid-1800s and dressed regularly not only in pants, but in a jacket, shirt, stiff collar, bow tie and top hat. Katz states "the exact nature of her sexual proclivities remains a mystery," but he calls her a "transvestite," and one can surmise she may have been a very repressed homosexual woman.
